(incoming the in Regulatory Gazares) March 5, 1969 MEMORANDUM FOR Mr. Ellsworth Mr. Hofgren Mr. Rose Subject: Regulatory agencies I have received on a confidential basis some comments on a discussion of the role of the regulatory agencies by a group of Commissioners from the various agencies. Following are some of the key points that came out during that discussion: 1. There is apparently great interest in improved relations between the independent regulatory agencies and the executive branch. This apparently derives from a recognition that the traditional independence of these agencies makes coordination among themselves and with executive departments very difficult. There was interest in establishing some sort of mechanism for regular and systematic contacts with the executive branch. 2. The Commissioners apparently feel particularly the lack of policy guidance with respect to conglomerate mergers. This is particularly difficult because firms subject to regulation have in some cases been acquired by nonregulated conglomerates. 3. Commissioners clearly feel isolated and without constituency in the public or the executive branch. 4. There is apparently genuine interest in more objective professional analysis of policy issues. 5. There was some interest in the idea that the executive branch agencies could usefully be more aggressive in presenting the public interest views on a regular basis in agency hearings. I am sure you would want to know the results of an authoritative private poll which we have just received -- based on a complete national sample taken two days after the President's April 20 TV Address on Vietnam.

Approval of "the way Richard Nixon is handling his job as President" has moved from the pre-speech Gallup rating of 55% to 62%.

The positive effect of the speech is shown by a comparison of the ratings of this speech and the November 3 Vietnam speech. In both cases 69% of those who heard, saw or read about the speech said they had a "favorable" reaction.

To Wit Office paper THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON May 21, 1969 MEMORANDUM FOR THE WHITE HOUSE STAFF Subject: Contacts between the White House and the Independent Regulatory Agencies The independent regulatory agencies include: Civil Aeronautics Board Federal Communications Commission Federal Maritime Commission Federal Power Commission Federal Trade Commission Interstate Commerce Commission Securities and Exchange Commission This memorandum discusses some important points you should bear in mind with regard to these agencies. Contacts between the White House and the regulatory agencies are very sensitive on two grounds: (1) The Congress has a special relationship with these agencies, viewing them in part as instruments of the Congress in its constitutional power to regulate interstate and foreign commerce; (2) the Commissioners of these agencies have quasi-judicial responsibilities for individual cases coming before their agencies on rates, license renewals, route awards, and so forth. Obviously, any executive interference in this quasi-judicial function would be highly improper. In spite of these sensitivities, matters often arise which do require official or informal contacts with the Commissioners or the staffs of these agencies. The following guidelines are provided for any exposure you may have to these agencies or problems pending before them. They also apply in those cases where other agencies of the executive branch act in a regulatory or quasi-judicial role.

- 1. Any expression of interest or any attempt to influence the outcome of any case pending is illegal. These cases are typically extremely complicated, and it is very dangerous to make judgments on the basis of limited information as to how the White House should like to see any case resolved. You should in no way express interest to these agencies in the outcome of pending cases and in no way attempt to influence the Commissioners or hearing examiners in their decisions on any case pending before their agencies.
- 2. It is important to remember that the cases that come before these agencies are often extremely important to the parties concerned and involve large amounts of money. They are, therefore, very closely watched for any evidence of improper procedure or influence. It is important to avoid even the mere appearance of interest or influence.
- 3. You may, of course, listen to comments and views on such cases when they are volunteered to you. However, such visits or the submission of written briefs should not be encouraged -- better still, they should be sidestepped and avoided wherever possible.
- 4. Inquiries about the status of cases pending before these agencies should not be made. Instead, the inquirer should be advised to contact the agency directly.
- 5. The policies and findings of these agencies often interact heavily with the policies of the executive branch of Government. Transportation policy, for instance, is affected heavily by the policies of the ICC and the CAB. There is, therefore, occasion for White House staff contact with these agencies. However, for the reasons cited above, you should keep my office informed of any contact you may have with these agencies. Please call Dan Hofgren or Tom Whitehead in advance to assure appropriateness of such contacts.

We have been advised that during the period of planned demonstrations November 13-15, the following changes in control points for access to the White House and EOB will take place.

November 13-15

From 6:00 p.m. Thursday, November 13 through 8:00 a.m. Saturday, November 15, there will be a single file march along a route that will include the south side of Pa. Ave. from 17th St. to East Executive Ave. During that period, northern entrances to the White House and EOB will be at:

- 1. Southeast corner of 17th St. and Pa. Ave.
- 2. Southwest corner of East Executive Ave. and Pa. Ave.
- 3. The bus stop located in front of EOB on Pa. Ave. will be moved during this period to the southwest corner of 17th St. and Pa. Ave. All other entrances to the White House and EOB will be at their normal

locations.

November 15

From 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 15, a security cordon will be established around the White House as indicated on the attached map. During this time access to the White House and EOB areas will be through the following check points:


Pedestrian Check Points

- 1. H St. and Jackson Place
- 2. H St. and Madison Place
- 3. 17th St. and E Street
- 4. New York and 15th St.

Vehicle Check Points

- 1. New York Ave. and 15th St.
- 2. 18th St. and E Street

No vehicles will be allowed on 17th St. unless cleared through one of the vehicle check points. Each individual will be required to present his identification when passing through the check points. There will be no White House tours on Saturday, November 15.

Secret Service White House Police Military Personnel During recent White House ceremonies and on past Presidential visits out of the Washington area, members of the Presidential party, White House staff, and support elements have failed to render the proper courtesy to visiting dignitaries or the President. When a foreign visitor is at the White House and this occurs, it reflects adversely on the President and our government. In this regard, we here at the White House should be the first to set the example for other Americans attending our functions. On visits to other countries, failure to render proper courtesy on our part is disrespectful to our President as well as to the foreign head of state and government. To assist you, I am distributing a small pocket card describing the proper ceremonial etiquette for your respective group. I encourage everyone at the White House to read the card; to become thoroughly familiar with the correct courtesy actions required of you; and then to practice the proper procedures at all times. WHITE HOUSE TRANSPORTATION AGENCY RULES

The White House Transportation Agency is available to assist the staff in moving throughout the Washington area for official business. Since the number of vehicles and drivers is limited, it is necessary to restrict the use of transportation and to follow certain rules to assure fair and equitable use.

Accordingly, the Agency has been instructed to provide portal-to-portal transportation for those persons designated as Group (A). Portal-to-portal transportation is defined to include all official trips including transportation to and from work.

Restricted official use is authorized for those persons designated as Group (B). Restricted official use includes official trips in the Washington area, but not transportation to and from work. Female staff members who use public transportation and who work after 8:00 p.m. may request transportation home. This service will be provided whenever possible.

To assure availability of transportation for official use, it is necessary that all members of the staff observe the following rules:

- 1. Do not ask drivers to wait more than 20 minutes. Drivers are instructed to return to the garage after discharge of passengers.
- 2. Do not request transportation to or from restaurants, hotels or to private homes for recreational purposes.
- 3. Do not request transportation for members of your family.
- 4. Persons authorized (A) or (B) type transportation may authorize official use of cars for staff members and official visitors. If any questions arise, call the Armed Forces Aide's office.

Due to the location of the garage, you should allow 10 minutes for a car to travel to the White House.

THE WHITE HOUSE Washington January 20, 1969 MEMORANDUM FOR White House Staff Mess Members Subject: White House Staff Mess Regulations The purpose of the White House Staff Mess is to furnish breakfast and luncheon service as a convenience for designated key personnel whose duties require that they be available in the vicinity of the White House Office spaces. A secondary purpose is to provide guest privileges for Mess members. Limitations of space and staff make it necessary to divide the membership list into three groups: Group I, Group II, and Honorary. The group to which you belong is as indicated on the slip attached. The meal hours for the Mess are as follows: Breakfast - 7:00 to 9:00 A, M. for members of all groups Lunch - Group I: 11:30 A. M. to 12:30 P. M. Group II and Honorary Members: 1:00 to 2:30 P.M. The Mess is normally closed on Sundays and holidays. Luncheon prices range from 75¢ to \$1.75 per meal. At the end of each month a bill will be sent to your office. Prompt payment is required to ensure that the necessary funds are available for operation of the Mess. The preferred method of payment is by personal check because there is no guarantee of security when cash is sent through the mail. Checks should be made payable to the White House Staff Mess and should be sent to the Office of the Armed Forces Aide to the President. Since we wish to serve the maximum number of members and guests, observance of the following rules is requested: Group I Group I members are requested to arrive for luncheon not later than 12:30 P.M. to ensure completion of your meal prior to 1:00 P. M.

Group II and Honorary Members

The period from 1:00 to 2:30 P. M. will be reserved for Group II and Honorary Members. These members are encouraged to eat during this time, however, Group II Members may eat at any time that the Mess is open. In addition, Group II Members may invite Group I Members to eat with them during the period from 1:00 to 2:30 P. M.

Guest Privileges

Mess members will be allowed to bring guests to the Mess if prior reservations have been made. Reservations are made by calling the Mess (extension 2610 or Signal Board). The reservation system will assure members that a table is available and that the Mess is able to accommodate the extra personnel. Members may make reservations for up to four guests. Exceptions to this limitation must be approved by the Office of the Armed Forces Aide.

Seating is at a premium between 1:00 and 2:00 P. M. on week-days. Because of this, the total number of guests allowed in the Mess during this period must be limited. When that limitation has been reached, those calling subsequently for guest reservations will be advised that they cannot be accommodated prior to 2:00 P. M. If your schedule permits, the dining room Chief Steward will take your name on a Standby Basis and call you when a table is available.

One of the purposes of the Mess is to provide a pleasant atmosphere in which working conversations can take place. All members are therefore asked to observe the custom of not inviting guests who might overhear conversations which should not be public knowledge.

Miscellaneous Items

Parties will be given separate tables whenever possible, but, at times when there are many members and guests, it may be necessary to ask parties of 2 to share a table for 4. The round table is reserved for members without guests, but, when this table is full, members may sit at any unreserved table. The reserved tables are for those members who have requested guest reservations.

There may arise occasions when personnel of the Mess are needed to perform functions elsewhere. In such cases, service must be curtailed in the Mess and it may not be possible to accommodate guests in any number. Should this happen, those having reservations for guests will be advised in order that they may seek service elsewhere. Service to members will always be available, but may not be as rapid during a period of reduced staffing.

The Mess does not have sufficient personnel to provide room service for other than those so designated by separate memorandum. Exceptions to this rule can only be made on an individual basis by the Office of the Armed Forces Aide to the President.

Coffee is normally available for pickup in the Mess between the hours of 7:30 A.M. and 9:00 P.M. Charges for coffee will be included in your monthly Mess bill.

With your cooperation, we intend to provide members of the White House Staff Mess with the excellent food and service they desire in a pleasant atmosphere and convenient location. Any suggestions which will help us improve the service are sincerely welcomed.

Mr. Whitehood January 21, 1969 MEMORANDUM TO WHITE HOUSE TRANSITIONAL STAFF PERSONNEL OF PRESIDENT-ELECT RICHARD M. NIXON We would like to take this opportunity to outline some of the duties and security responsibilities of the White House Police for the protection of the President, his family and staff. The White House Police is charged with the protection of the President and his family while in residence, the Mansion, Grounds and any building containing White House Offices, or other duties so designated by the Secretary of the Treasury. The Force is supervised and directed by the Director of the United States Secret Service through the Commanding Officer of the White House Police. The White House Police do not initiate appointments to any White House Office. Therefore, no one will be admitted through any of the gates unless prior approval is received from your office. We ask your cooperation in sharing with us a degree of responsibility for maximum security protection of all White House occupants and classified materials. The following guidelines and suggestions are offered to facilitate the entrance of persons invited on an appointment basis to your White House or EOB Office or to meet with the President or Vice President. The below listed procedures will enable the police to do a more efficient job in expediting the inflow of invited guests with little or no delay. 1. In advance, where possible, please have your secretary call the names of your appointments to the following Police Control Posts where applicable: Phone 4578 6th Floor PRIOR TO 1-20-69 FOB #7 Phone 41.47 7th Floor White House West Wing Lobby AFTER 1-20-69 White House

In the case of three (3) or more appointments, a list should be furnished directly, in alphabetical order, a minimum of six (6) copies. Last minute appointments (less than three when possible) could be called directly to the Control Post.

The necessary information is:

- a. Names of persons to be admitted.
- b. Time of their arrival.
- c. Staff member sponsoring the appointment.
- d. Person giving appointment information from within authorizing office.
- e. Telephone number or extension to verify last minute changes.
- 2. We would like to have advance notice should large groups be invited to meet with you or to have a meeting with the President, especially where such groups would use the Mansion, South Grounds, etc. It is requested that an alphabetized list of names and the number of cars or busses involved, be forwarded to the White House Police, Room Number E-107 and the Secret Service, Room Number E-200 East Wing.
- 3. Usually, there are no parking facilities available for the private autos of persons having appointments in the West Office. Police usually have answers for problems regarding the handling of parking.

PARKING PROCEDURES followed at this time are:

a. Chauffer driven limousines of cabinet members are usually parked in the South Grounds or on West Executive Avenue.

- b. Off Record Appointments for the President are usually parked in the South Grounds, entering by the Southwest or Southeast Gates.
- c. Appointments for the President or First Lady in the Mansion are usually parked in the North or South Grounds.
- d. Guests for Social Receptions usually enter through the Southwest Gate, Northwest Gate or East Gate. Parking facilities are as the occasion demands -North and/or South Grounds, closing streets, etc., for large receptions.
- e. Appointments with Special Assistants, where possible, should be requested to come by taxi due to the limited parking facilities.
- 4. In order to expedite appointments to the proper office and to be knowledgeable of the location of all Staff Assistants, we need the following information:
 - a. Names of personnel in various offices.
 - b. Room number.
 - c. Telephone number or extension.

If you have deletions or additions to your Staff, please notify my office, White House extension 2180, so that we may keep our records up to date.

SECURITY ROUNDS White House Police make security rounds after working hours and check all safes and desks. Any classified material found will be placed in a safe until the next working day, or until called for. If desired, our Security Officer will advise personnel of existing regulations concerning the safeguarding of classified and other sensitive materials.

SECURITY CONTROL - WORKMEN AND DELIVERYMEN

Purpose To acquire background knowledge about the character of all who may penetrate the Security of the White House or the Executive Office Building. This is a process where we eliminate many small problems before they become major problems. This function is carried out through the combined efforts of Technical Security Division, United States Secret Service, and the White House Police.

We would like to have several days notice of any outsiders/workers coming in to perform any jobs, if it requires a security check and a security escort.

WHITE HOUSE TOURS Public and Special VIP Tours are arranged through an Assistant to the President. The Mansion is usually open Tuesdays through Saturdays and 10 a.m. until 12 Noon for public tours. VIP tours for close friends of the President, Vice President, and members of other Executive, Judicial and Legislative Branches of our Government are conducted between 7:50 a.m. and 9:50 a.m., and at any other time as desired by the President or members of his immediate family. All tours are conducted by White House Police trained tour interpreters, who double as security officers as well as interpreters.

PARKING EMPLOYEES Limited employee parking is available. Areas available for employee parking are predesignated and the approval of the Special Assistant is required before a permit is issued.

The White House Police are charged with the responsibility of issuing parking decals and enforcing the regulations. The parking areas are West Executive Avenue (Top Staff Assistants in White House and Executive Office Building without portal to portal transportation), East Executive Avenue, Ellipse, North and South Courts of EOB.

If there are questions or special problems concerning the above, do not hesitate to call my office for assistance (White House Extension 2180).

CALLING INSTRUCTIONS

Direct Local & Long Distance In-Dialing Telephone Service

In order to make effective use of the system and to expedite telephone calls into the White House complex, personnel should familiarize callers from outside government with the system by giving them the number (Area Code 202, if applicable) 456 and the extension number.

Calls to Other Government Agencies (Non Centrex):

The Interdepartmental Dial System permits calls to be made to or from extensions in other agencies without the help of a telephone attendant.

If the extension number is known, dial the agency code followed by the extension number. There will be no second dial tone following the dialing of the code.

If the extension number is not known, dial the agency code, followed by "0" or a special number for operator information as listed in this directory. (Example) State Dept code 182/4448.

Calls from Other Government Agencies (Non Centrex):

Callers from within the government should be told to dial the Interdepartmental Code 145 and your four digit extension number.

Calls from Centrex to Centrex:

Calls between Centrex locations must be accomplished by dialing 9 followed by the direct-in-dial seven digit number, if known.

If the extension number is not known, dial 9 plus the assistance and information number of the desired agency.

Calls to Outside Local Numbers:

Listen for dial tone, dial 9 (dial tone is continuous), then dial the desired number.

Calls to Other Telephones in the White House Complex:

(Residence, Executive Office of the President, and White House Communications Agency):

Listen for dial tone and then dial the four digit extension number, if known. For information dial operator.

For information on an extension in the Executive Office of the President dial 3000.

Information from the White House Communication Agency switchboard may be gained by dialing 2000.

Federal Telecommunications System (FTS):

The FTS is a leased long distance network which permits calls to be made through these facilities to any telephone within the continental United States.

To place calls through the FTS network listen for dial tone, dial the access code 80, then dial the Area Code plus the 7 digits of the number desired.

Long Distance Calls:

All other long distance calls should be placed through the White House telephone switchboard so that an accurate charge record is maintained. Emergency personal calls made by this means are charged to the caller's home telephone or personal credit card number.

Transferring Calls:

All incoming calls to your extension, whether dialed directly or connected by the attendant, can be transferred to any other extension within the system. To transfer a call, depress the plunger or switchhook briefly, about one second - just once. Wait for the attendant to answer, give her the number to which the call is to be transferred. When she has acknowledged your instructions, hang up.

It is important to remember that outgoing calls can not be transferred by the originating station.

Conference Calls:

All conference calls are to be placed with your switchboard attendant. Dial "0" for your attendant, announce that you wish to place a conference call. Give her the numbers of the parties to be connected and, when possible, remain on the line until all parties are connected.
