MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE OFFICE OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS POLICY AND THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

Reorganization Plan No. 1 of 1970, Executive Order 11556, "Assigning Telecommunications Functions," and the Office of Management and Budget Determination Order, effective 1 October 1970, authorize the transfer of certain functions, personnel, funds, records, and resources from the Office of Emergency Preparedness to the Office of Telecommunications Policy.

In consonance with these directives, the Office of Telecommunications
Policy and the Department of Commerce hereby enter into an agreement
as follows:

- 1. The Interdepartment Radio Advisory Committee (IRAC) will continue as an advisory body to the Office of Telecommunications Policy. The IRAC Secretariat in the Office of Telecommunications Policy, however, shall be transferred to the Department of Commerce effective 18 October 1970. A total of 21 personnel (see attached schedule) performing various duties relating to the functions of IRAC and funds for salaries in the amount of \$208,000 will be transferred to support such personnel and activities.
- 2. The IRAC Secretariat shall continue to occupy space in the Office of Telecommunications Policy pending the preparation of adequate facilities within the Department of Commerce. Physical transfer of the IRAC Secretariat personnel, property, and records to the Department of Commerce, however, shall take place on or about 1 January 1971.
- 3. Computer support for the IRAC Secretariat will be furnished without charge for the remainder of FY 1971 by the Office of Emergency Preparedness pursuant to a prior agreement arrived at between the Office of Telecommunications Policy and the Office of Emergency Preparedness.

A. Coordination of specific details relative to the above transfer will be accomplished by the administrative staffs of the respective agencies.

This Agreement will be effective 18 October 1970.

Subject Status of OTP

OTP presently wears two hats. Insofar as it has been instituted to carry out legislative responsibilities, it is an office not unlike other executive agencies, and its authority is derived exclusively from Congressional action. Insofar as OTP functions are advisory rather than substantive in nature, i.e., in that it recommends policy, advises the President, etc., it is not an "office" in the constitutional sense.

Whether, against such a background, OTP should see itself as an executive agency or as part of the White House, requires a balancing of arguments. It may be argued pro agency status for OTP that:

- (a) OTP is already functioning like an agency insofar as its obligations under the Federal Communications Act are concerned;
- (b) Proposals, policies, etc., coming out of executive agencies are viewed as being less partisan and more scientific than similar products produced by White House offices.

It may be argued against executive agency status for OTP that since OTP has no formal rulemaking authority and no operative role outside of government telecommunications, such status would deprive OTP of the only real power base it now has, i.e., the White House.

Secondly, since all agency heads are removable at will by the President, "objective" agency status really does not offer greater credibility than White House status. Executive agency status for OTP is not without limitations, but on balance, it offers more opportunity for the constructive and effective functioning of this office.

Procedures for communications between OTP and the White House in such a scheme are not altogether clear. The Counselor System has been abolished, and Gen. Haig's role is not yet known. That leaves:

- A. Liaison through Secretary Shultz in his capacity as Chairman of the Council on Economic Policy;
- B. Liaison through the Domestic Council or O.M.B. depending on the nature of the problem, project, etc.;
- C. Direct liaison with the President, a la Department heads. This clearly is the most effective and therefore most preferable procedure, but of course the most difficult to achieve.
