Dear Dr. Whitehead:

The Hollywood Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences would be honored if you could accept an invitation to be our keynote speaker at the Saturday, March 31st seminar on cable television to be held at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

For the past three years we have had an annual cable tv meeting, but last year's was the first all-day meeting. It surpassed our most optimistic projections, with a thousand in attendance, and several hundred more turned away for lack of space. Brian Lamb has a copy of last year's agenda which will give you some indication of the level of participants who addressed the meeting. We have every reason to expect as large and as mixed an audience this year: television and film industry executives, producers, directors, actors, technical personnel, students, educators, and cable executives, as well as those who aspire to work in the industry. I hope that addressing such a group would serve a timely purpose for you; I know it would be an outstanding event for those of us who are organizing the day's presentation, and for our audience.

Because I feel so strongly that yours would be a major contribution, I am delaying inviting any other speaker who might address himself to areas of governmental policy until you have indicated an interest in being with us. I should also like to offer you any one of three possible spots on the program. We feel, based on our past experience, that the strongest spot might well be the opening one, at 9:30 (or thereabouts). If, on the other hand, you would rather wrap up the morning session, I should be happy to structure the meeting that way. These are two good alternatives.

In the past, our luncheon speakers have dealt with more casual or personal aspects of a subject: Irving Kahn, for example, on why cable was more important than cassettes (in his admittedly prejudiced view), and Mike Dann on how someone from commercial television came to be working in cable from within the Children's Television Workshop. The kind of informational thoughtful address I feel sure you would make seems to us better situated in the morning, but the decision is yours to make.

The program is still in the formative stage with a working title of Update on Cable: Performance and Promise. After an opening speech, there will be brief presentations under the heading of "One Year Later" by some of the people who were on our panels last year reporting on what has happened since then. We will also have some observations from the president of one of the MSO's on present and future plans, from one of the pay-cable operations outlining that area, and from someone representing educational and public access use of cable.

The afternoon will have two concurrent sessions, one on programming copyright and marketing to the consumer, and another on pay-cable, the new technology, and how it is being sold to the CATV operating systems. There will also be exhibits.

We very much look forward to hearing from you, and hope you will be able to accept our invitation. Last year, Sol Schildhause and John Gwin called our meeting one of the best cable conferences of the year. I can assure you that your participation will certainly make this one the most important cable conference of this year.
