


My dear Mr. President:



SUBJECT:

Public Broadcasting

James Killian, the current CPB Chairman, and Ralph Rodgers, the PBS Chairman, have requested a meeting with the President to discuss public broadcasting objectives.

James Killian is a Johnson appointee who was recently elected CPB Chairman in a display of independence by the Board, after the previous Chairman, Tom Curtis, resigned charging the Administration attempted to influence the Corporation to preclude funding of news and public affairs programs. Under the leadership of Killian, who supports the airing of public affairs shows, CPB worked out a compromise with PBS which established procedures for the broadcast of public affairs programs.

Ralph Rodgers, the PBS Chairman, is a wealthy Texas businessman, former Finance Chairman of George Bush's Senate campaign and a self-proclaimed supporter of the President. Nonetheless, he has opposed almost every aspect of the Administration's public broadcasting posture, actively working to re-establish public affairs shows and criticizing the Administration for putting public broadcasting on a "starvation diet."

I do not believe that the President should meet with these men now. The recent and stormy public broadcasting controversy and the present uncertainty regarding both the level of CPB funding and the way in which the CPB-PBS compromise will actually function, would make it difficult for the President to hold a meeting now. Killian has already announced his intention to resign before the end of the year and we are actively looking for a new Chairman. (We will appoint 7 new Board members over the next year.) At the end of the year, a public broadcasting meeting with the new Chairman would be more appropriate, because the funding problem will be resolved, we will know for sure whether or not the CPB-PBS compromise is a step in the right direction, and Tom Whitehead will have initiated new discussions to fashion a long-term solution to the public broadcasting problems.


It has come to my attention that James Killian, the Chairman of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, and Ralph Rogers, the Chairman of the Public Broadcasting Service, have requested a meeting with the President to discuss public broadcasting.

As you know, I have had the principal responsibility for dealing with the public broadcasting controversy as it has developed over the past two years. Both Killian and Rogers have shown a marked disinclination to discuss their objectives with us. Indeed, over the past few months they have been strongly critical of the Administration's goals for public broadcasting and have accused us of attempting to starve or suffocate public broadcasting in order to undercut public broadcasting's ability to criticize the Administration.

In this regard, I think it would be a big mistake for the President to meet with these men, especially with the CPB funding still pending on the Hill, and I strongly oppose such a meeting. What is called for is a letter from the President to Killian and Rogers begging off on any meeting and urging them to meet instead with me. For your information, Killian and Rogers have not seen fit to discuss these matters with me or with Ken Cole.

Finally, while I can appreciate the present circumstances which may have led to a breakdown in the normal staffing procedures, it is disturbing to have to learn about this request for a meeting with the President through the White House grapevine rather than a direct request for

my views on this matter. In the future, I hope that we can return to the established procedures for staffing all issues dealing with public broadcasting and other communications matters that fall within the purview of my office.

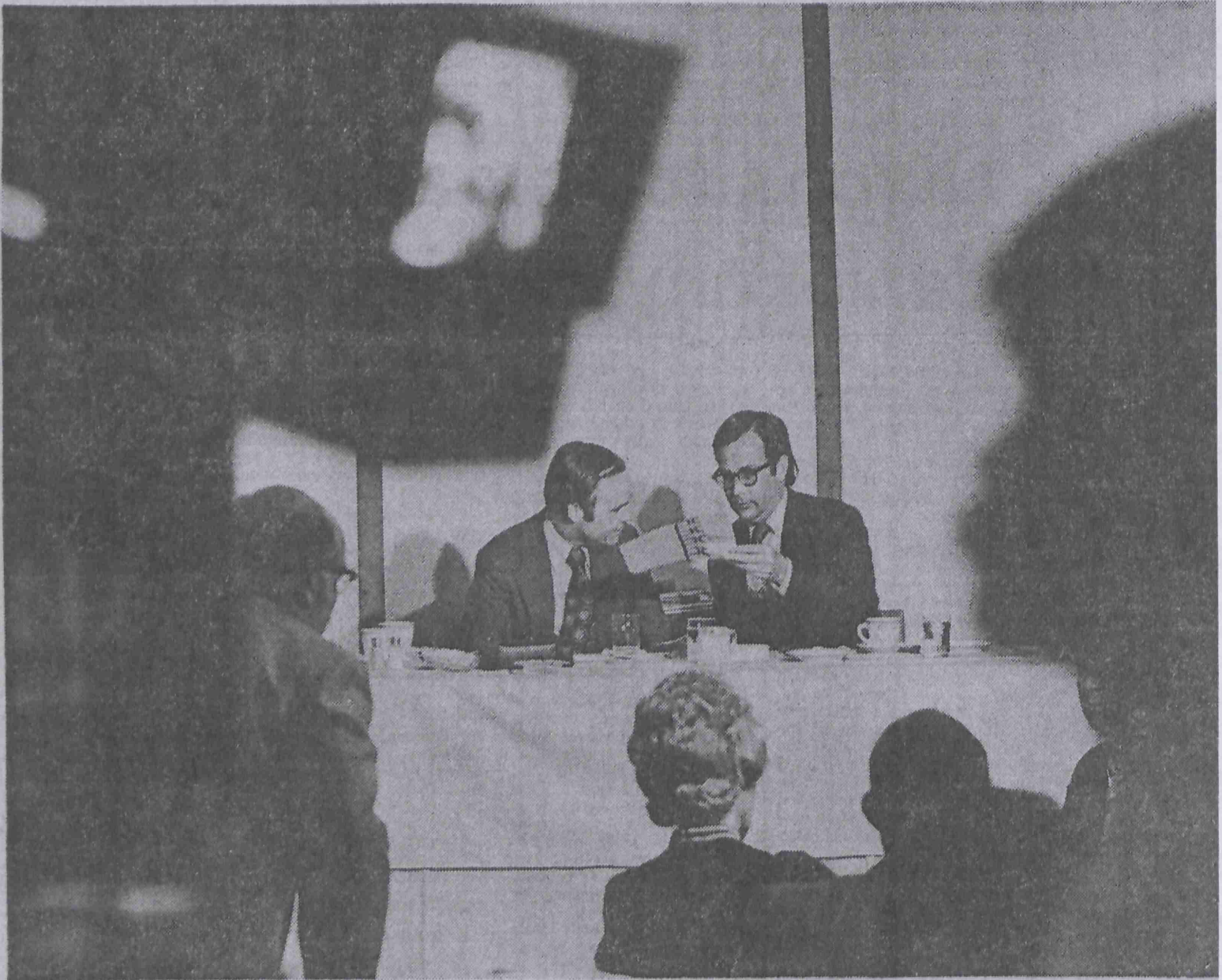

Nixon Aide at KSC Confab

Public Role in TV Empl

The public should take more control of television and the government should have less say in the content of programs, be they on commercial or public broadcasting.

That was the gint of the meassage conveyed by Clay T. Whitehead, director of the White House Office of Telecommunications Policy (OTP), at the opening session of the second annual Publi-Cable Conference at Kutztown State College Thursday night.

Mr. Whitehead spoke to more than 400 persons gathered in the new dining hall and urged that "no government control be exercised over the content of television." This can be better done by the local community or area where the program originates he claimed.

His thoughts came in a talk on "A View from the White House on Cable Television" and answers to questions from the audience and reporters.

He stressed several times that "the policy toward television has not been completed and submitted to the President so I don't feel it fair to reveal it here."

Two-Way Circuit

In a special feature of the conference dealing with television and the wider use of public television for the entire nation, a two-way micro-wave hook-up was connected into the dining hall. Mr. Whitehead was seen on color television and talked directly with Mayor Eugene L. Shirk in Reading. Questions were asked from Reading and Mr. Whitehead replied.

The two-way conversation and television was a first in the area and was accomplished by the Berks-Suburban TV Cable Co., 1112 Muhlenberg St.

Mr. Whitehead directed himself to public television mostly, but went into the history of TV and its long dependence on regulations from the government.

At one point he warned: "We have to be very careful to see that the public decides on which way television goes."

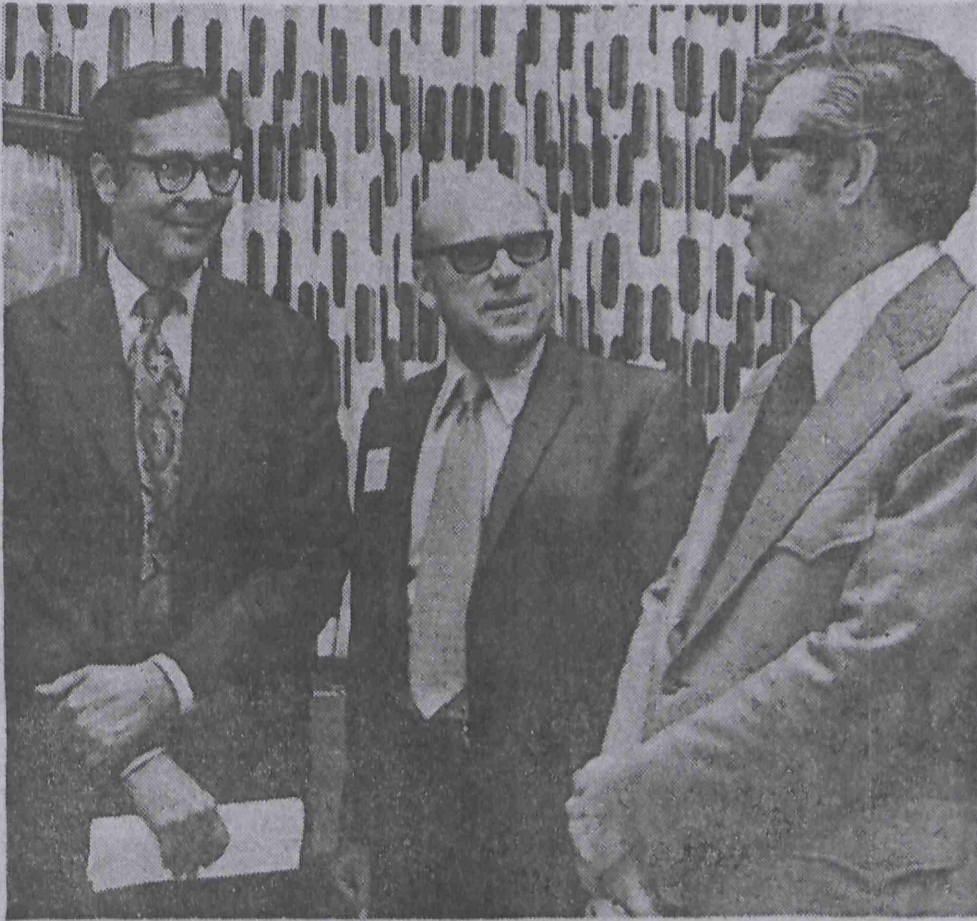
What Role?

He noted: "Cable (television) can be viewed as a multi-channel communication with the owner and government deciding."

"Or," he continued. "cable can be available as a highway with each of us picking off what we would like to hear."

He also leaned hard on the idea that government should be around and is needed "just as television is needed by the government."

He urged that technical regulations and economic aid would get a "yes" from him when it comes to government "but as for content regulation, no."

He carried this concept a little farther by noting that "censorship is bad only when it applies to our ideas and not to all."

Reflecting on cable television, he said: "Is cable television to be like a newstand with something for everyone. Or is it to be like network TV today where a few companies with government regulations decide."

The 34-year-old spokesman for President Nixon said: "We should strive for a system we all want — wide and open access."

Along this line, Mr. Whitehead, who has a doctorate in management but seldom uses his title, noted that public cable can be a great help.

As a governmental spokesman, he said: "We're aware of the potential uses of (cable) in education, in community development, health care . . ."

Then, he emphasized: "The people have to know about this."

On the opening day of their three-day conference at Kutz-

town State College, Thursday, more than 400 members of the National Publi-Cable Conference discussed the future's possibilities.

"As for administration criticism of the press, I think it is a healthy thing. I don't believe the guarantee of free press was intended to create a privileged class of citizens known as journalists.

"The government and the press are, and should be, adversaries — that's called checks and balances. But, as Sen. Hugh Scott recently said, 'No one likes to be checked and balanced,' Whitehead related.

Whitehead does not think that the public has to be subjected to the instant analysis of network newsmen (which he has called "ideological plugola") without a means of recourse.

"IF THE PUBLIC dislikes something they see on television now, they must go to their congressmen who, in turn, must bring it to the attention of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

"Under our bill, disgruntled viewers need only make it known to the station manager. If that manager continually disregards public sentiment, he may have his license to broadcast revoked," Whitehead said.

Is there a danger that FCC licensing may become a political football, dependent on the whims of politicians?

"I don't foresee that happening. After all, the FCC will still be in operation and it will be its duty to prevent such occurrences."

THEY FORESEE the day when every area in the nation will have three cable television stations serving it. One station will cover local education, one the government, and the other will focus on the community as a whole.

"At the moment, the public is not that involved or knowledgeable about cable television," Dr. Harold Wigren, educational tv consultant for the National Education Assn., said.

"But they will be when we are able to televise things like town meetings," he added.

THE HIGHLIGHT of the conference's opening day was

House Office of Telecommunications Policy.

Via equipment owned and operated by Berks-Suburban CATV Co., Whitehead's speech was broadcast back to Reading.

Mayor Eugene L. Shirk and former League of Women Voters president Mrs. Esther Krasevac, who were in a Reading studio, were then permitted to speak live with Whitehead.

Today, the members will tour the Berks-Suburban facilities in the city and at Governor Mifflin and Wilson high schools.

THERE WILL also be a videotape screening festival.

On Saturday, the conference's closing day, experts in various communications fields will lecture.

The conference is co-sponsored by the Allentown Dis-

University, Berks Intermediate Unit, Berks-Suburban CATV Co., Kutztown State College, the Pennsylvania State Education Assn. and Schuylkill Intermediate Unit.

TV man for Nixon speaks up

Clay T. Whitehead is a political salesman.

With President Nixon adrift in domestic limbo awaiting the outcome of Watergate, it is up to the men on the periphery of the White House to push the legislation the administration wants.

WHITEHEAD, 35-year-old director of the White House Office of Telecommunication Policy, made his pitch Thursday night to 400 members of the National Publi-Cable Conference, meeting this week at Kutztown State College.

Presently, television shows are primarily controlled by the networks and commercial interests. Whitehead is proposing that independent television station owners and the public be offered greater say.

"The administration, through this legislation now pending in Congress, is attempting to give the public a greater say in the content matter of television programming."

"In short, we think that the public should be able to view the television shows that they want to see, when they want to see them," Whitehead said.

"We think it should be incumbent upon station owners to make sure they reflect the interest of the community they serve," he added.

Whitehead, who has a Ph.D. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, said he didn't know how the plan would be implemented.

"How can the community's wants and needs be channeled into a television station's programming? That is something we will have to work out."

CRITICS HAVE labeled this type of proposal as "the road to oppression and censure," but Whitehead, a defender of administration attacks on the media, disagrees.

"I just don't believe that this will obstruct the public's ability to be informed. I foresee a television that is diversified and multisided with varied points of views being aired," Whitehead declared.

Nixon Aide Says U.S. Should Avoid Cable TV Controls

Clay T. Whitehead, director of President Nixon's office of telecommunications policy, said last night that the federal government should not become involved in cable television programming.

He urged instead that Washington should only concern itself with setting technical and economic regulations, while assuring open access to cable TV by virtually everyone.

The federal aide suggested that such areas as First Amendment rights, libel laws and contemporary community standards might be used as guidelines to what is shown.

Whitehead, who is developing a White House policy on

cable TV, was the keynote speaker at the second annual Public-Cable Conference in Kutztown State College.

The program, which will end tomorrow, is sponsored by Publi-Cable, Inc., a federation of groups and individuals interested in the industry of cable television.

A highlight of the program was a question-and-answer session that involved Whitehead, speaking in the KSC dining hall, and a panel in the Reading offices of the Berks TV Cable Co.

The panelists were Reading Mayor Eugene F. Shirk and a member of that city's League of Women Voters.

Shirk asked Whitehead

whether a cable television service that permitted the Ku Klux Klan to broadcast a program was being too liberal.

Before Whitehead could reply, however, the signal was lost in Kutztown.

This elicited raucous laughter from the conference delegates, and prompted Whitehead to quip, "Now I can see why conspiracy theories develop."

When the signal was restored, Whitehead answered that, while he didn't sympathize with the Klan's views, it is a legal organization.

He noted that anyone has the opportunity to turn the program off.

"A much more difficult

area," he went on, "is that of obscenity and pornography."

Whitehead noted that some cable TV outlets have shown "R" and "X"-rated films.

Alluding to the village green concept of public speaking and action, the federal official declared, "We have rules of what is permissible conduct in public."

The representative of the Reading League of Women Voters asked Whitehead, in regard to libel, "Who should be held responsible — the speaker, the organization putting on the show, or the cable television owner?"

He answered that the current thinking of the Nixon administration office is that the

liability should fall on the speaker.

There were other instances of electronic gremlins sparking laughter and quips.

Moments after Whitehead took the podium, the television signal was lost. "Big brother is out there some place," he said.

A member of the audience yelled, "It's local control," obviously referring to Whitehead's controversial announcement last December that Nixon wanted to make local broadcasters responsible for the content of network offerings.

When he went back on the air, Whitehead retorted, "I knew I was going to make the

public cable and CATV (community antenna television) mad at me, but I didn't know just how mad."

Turning serious, he declared that the aim of the administration is to limit government control of commercial television, and have stations exercise more autonomy by utilizing community standards.

"That kind of policy, it seems to me, should be extended to cable," he declared.

In recounting the creation and history of the Federal Communications Commission, he pointed out that it was based on the theory that the airwaves belong to the public.

"Under that theory," he said, "government is inevita-

bly involved in control over those airwaves — from technical control to content."

He said the theory and limited airwaves led the government to make content ruling when it believed there were abuses in programming.

"The creeping hand of regulation keeps getting further and further involved," Whitehead added.

But cable television has practically no limitations on the number of channels and does not use public airwaves, he said.

For these reasons, Whitehead said, the government should not drift through a maze of regulations as it did with regular television.

Executive Questions Need for Monitors

The president of American Broadcasting Company News Friday stated his opposition to organized groups which survey the mass media and said, "The American public is the watch dog with the sharpest bite. A flick of the dial can silence us in any home."

In fact, said Elmer W. Lower, judging the press has "become a greater national pastime than baseball. At any neighborhood cocktail party it is the first subject after the jokes about the Watergate and hanky panky in the British House of Lords."

Lower was keynote speaker during the opening session of the third annual Associated Press Broadcasters Association convention at the Royal Sonesta Hotel. Other speakers included Gov. Edwin W. Edwards; Stanley Scott, special assistant to President Nixon; and New Orleans Chief of Police Clarence Giarrusso and Jefferson Parish Sheriff Alwynn Cronvich who discussed the Howard Johnson incident along with three local newsmen.

The ABC News president took exception to two particular groups which monitor the mass media — Accuracy in Media (AIM) and the recently organized National News Council — though he said "I do not question their right to exist."

What Lower did challenge was the need for such groups.

Twentieth Century Fund's Task Force (which financed a study and decided there was a need for the council) "tried to sell its idea of a National News Council on the grounds that no one was doing what it proposed to do on a national basis, that is, to keep tabs on the national news media," said Lower.

However, said Lower, besides the American public "watchdogs," there are the Federal Communications Commission, the Senate Commerce Committee on Communications, and individual groups commissioned by the networks and stations to analyze news content.

After criticism that ABC was unfair to the Nixon administration, an independent news analysis group studied ABC's content to decide what percentage would be considered favorable, neutral, or unfavorable to Nixon supporters.

Over a four year period they found that in news stories, 30 per cent would be considered

pleasing, 39 per cent neutral, and 31 per cent displeasing, said Lower. In commentary by Howard K. Smith and Harry Reasoner, 32 per cent were pleasing, 43 per cent neutral, and 25 per cent displeasing.

Lower said his company would cooperate with the National News Council by giving transcripts of programs, but added "we have no intention of appearing before the council to answer questions of why we did something, and we will not supply any film out-takes or audio tape not used on the air or reporters' notes. In general we will deal with the council at arm's length."

He said he was definitely opposed to any official, government-sponsored news council and gave an example of censorship of the press in Russia. "That it could happen here under certain circumstances should put the First Amendment at the top of our list of priorities."

Gov. Edwards also backed freedom of the press, and said, "This nation will not have a truly free press until we extend the full protection of the First Amendment to the broadcast media. Anything the courts, the Congress or state legislators do to protect the printed press should apply equally to the broadcast media."

The governor also urged television to allocate more time for

news programs since, he said, some 62 per cent of Louisianians depend largely on television for news.

Scott, who was a broadcaster before becoming a special assistant to President Nixon on minority affairs, encouraged the AP broadcasters to establish training programs for minorities.

"Blacks haven't been prepared for jobs in the broadcasting industry, because in the past they knew there wouldn't be any jobs available. You may have to train blacks as you did news commentators and journalists in the early days of the media. Not every journalist or broadcaster is college trained," he said. Scott also said that the media should be more concerned with events in the inner cities, and not just with fires and disasters in those areas. "The broadcast industry could become the leading problem solver in the country," he said. "If it becomes more attuned to the community it serves."

In discussing the Howard Johnson incident in which a sniper killed nine people and paralyzed the central business district, Supt. Giarrusso praised the media for their coverage. The only exception he took was with a radio station that said the police needed more guns and sharpshooters. "As a result of this announcement, a certain

number of people responding endangered their lives and the lives of policemen," he said.

On the plus side, Giarrusso said the media reports minimized rumors and pedestrian and automobile traffic and kept citizens informed of events taking place at the hotel.

Sheriff Cronvich also praised local coverage with two exceptions. First, he objected to the same radio report mentioned by Giarrusso; and second, to an analogy made in the written press of the incident with the Vietnam War, which he said was "grossly overstated."

He had harsher words for the national press. "For three days after the event every national broadcast I saw presented interviews with the mother and family of the sniper. I believe it would have been sufficient to have covered that on the morning and evening news of one day."

"I feel that too often the news media is more interested in presenting the sides of those who want to destroy the country than those who want to keep it together," added Cronvich.

Phil Johnson, news director of WWL-TV, replied that he thought the reason there was extensive coverage of Mark Essex's family was that people wanted to know what sort of person did this terrible thing and why.

Giarrusso said he feels now

Besides Johnson, other news directors who spoke on the background of getting full coverage of the sniper attack were Alec Gifford, WVUE-TV, and John Korbel, WDSU-TV.

Moderator Fred Hammond of WWL radio said that Mayor Moon Landrieu had been invited to be on the panel to explain his criticism of press coverage, but that he refused. Gifford elaborated on Landrieu's reply to the invitation. "He said he didn't have enough time to spend with the thin-skinned news media," said Gifford with a slight smile on his face.

Whitehead Opposes Content Controls

Dr. Clay Whitehead, director of the federal Office of Telecommunications Policy (OTP), said Friday that though many in Congress feel that it is legitimate to apply content controls to television broadcasting, he opposes it "flatly, categorically."

Dr. Whitehead addressed the third annual Associated Press Broadcasters Association (APBA) convention at the Royal Sonesta Hotel here.

Whitehead told the APBA that content control in broadcast news should come from within the profession, rather than from the government.

"If the electronic press in this country is a free institution — independent of the White House, independent of the Congress, independent of advertisers, independent of viewers — then you act.

Whitehead said that there has been too much government involvement in content of TV programming.

"That should be reversed," he added.

Whitehead said he sees the need for a free voice in television news, more hours of news on TV, and more vigorous electronic news responsibility on the part of news directors and station managers.

He said, "I am sure there should be no FCC rule — the FCC acting as an arm of Congress — on program percentages."

There should be no national federal government program standards. There should be no federal government decision that it's OK for a network to feed the Wild Kingdom to the

possible to get the FCC and Congress to reverse the trend toward more and more content control if broadcasters don't take on more responsibility.

Broadcasters should accept freedom and responsibility on a voluntary rather than a mandatory basis, he said.

"There is no question in my mind — there should be no question in anyone's mind — that the First Amendment of our constitution applies fully and completely to the electronic media, and OTP policies will always reflect that direction," he said.

Tom Fawley, vice-president of news for a nationwide broadcasting chain, was chosen president-elect of the National Asso-

broadcasting system headquartered in Washington, D.C. He will succeed Frank Balch of WJOY, Burlington, Vt. Balch was president-elect last year and now moves into the post, succeeding Tom Powell of WDAU-TV in Scranton, Pa.

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
